HELLO BACH FAMILIES,

You and your child's teacher share a unique partnership. You both have the same goal in mind: the well-being of your child. Parent-teacher conferences at Bach provide you with the opportunity to share things about your child that his teacher may not know. In turn, you may discover new things about your child as a learner.

The following tips adapted from the Harvard Research Project, an online resource, may help you make the most out of the fifteen minutes you have with your child's teacher:

- » Be prepared to have a conversation. The purpose of the conference is not to listen to your child's teacher talk the entire time. Be willing to share your thoughts as well as ask questions.
- » Be objective. More than likely, your child's teacher will share his strengths as well as areas in which he can improve. While we naturally want our children to excel in every aspect of school, this is not often the case. Come prepared with your own thoughts about his strengths and weaknesses. Discuss them with his teacher.
- » Be supportive. Your child's teacher wants him to succeed as much as you do. Ask her how you can reinforce her efforts at home and, if applicable, help her problem-solve situations that may exist in the classroom.
- » Be realistic about data. You will receive your child's fall NWEA reading and math scores. Keep in mind that these scores provide one data point about his progress. When coupled with his performance on tests, quizzes, homework, and everyday assignments, they help paint a larger picture. Each student will be working with his/her teacher to set goals in reading and math as well as action plans for achieving those goals. You will hear more about this process at your child's conference.
- » Talk to your child. If your child is not present at the conference, he will most likely be curious about what you discussed. Be sure to emphasize the positive, but do not hesitate to point out some of the challenges you may have discussed. Remind him that you and his teacher are united in an effort to support him.

Here's to a productive and successful conference for you, your child, and your child's teacher! Teachers will be holding conferences any time now until November 14th. Common evening conferences will be held Monday, November 7th. Remember to stop in and see specials teachers.

This week's Music Notes will center around what families can do at home to foster their child's love of music!

1. SING. Sing in the car. Sing while cooking dinner. Sing lullabies to bed. Sing while raking leaves. Sing with your child as much as possible!

2. PUT ON SOME MUSIC AND DANCE. Dance on your way up to brush teeth. Dance after dinner. Dance while picking up toys.

3. INVEST IN INSTRUMENTS. Electronic keyboards are not terribly expensive and can be very motivating for kids who are really into technology. Headphones can save your sanity as well! Recorders are only a \$5.50 investment. I'll even give your child tips if they want to play for me here at school. Private lessons are not just a good way to learn an instrument, but they are also the chance for your child to have another positive and encouraging relationship with a role model. Usually if an elementary kid starts private lessons on an instrument it is for piano, violin, or guitar. But maybe your child has another idea.

4. BE A GOOD AUDIENCE for your performing kids.

5. SEEK OUTSIDE SCHOOL OPPORTUNITIES! There are a multitude of music, drama, and dance organizations in Ann Arbor that would benefit your child. Check out Rec & Ed for some inexpensive ones. Ask me for more!

6. ATTEND PERFORMANCES! Between UMS, The Ark, Ann Arbor Symphony, Wild Swan, and The University of Michigan School of Music, Theater, and Dance there is something happening about every day. Find something you love to share with your child. Then try something new. (Also, UM student recitals are free. They would love bigger audiences! And the quality of performers is fantastic!)

7. ENROLL YOUR CHILD IN DANCE LESSONS. Again, Rec and Ed is a great resource. So is the YMCA. Physically responding to music is a wonderful way to develop musicality. And it burns some kid energy!

8. SEEK OUT SOME FABULOUS WEB VIDEOS to share with your child. I love OK GO videos. They are amazing. YouTube occasionally makes a big splash here in the music room. I will be happy to give you some good ones!

9. PUT PROGRAMMATIC MUSIC on at home and tell the story that goes with it. OR hopefully your child can share with you the stories we've enacted to orchestral music here at school.

While we study multiple genre of music here at Bach, for programmatic pieces that ignite a dramatic imagination, I give you a list of sample Classical music pieces we study in certain grades:

William Tell by Rossini

Hallelujah Chorus from Messiah by Handel


